Is El Cid the only course near town? I heard ElCid is private and expensive. Is the course near the airport private too? Do you know if there is an artist's supply store in Mazatlan?

We live in Nevada City and have been mulling over the idea of moving to either Maz or PV since the year 2001. I am very energetic and my passion is painting and sculpting. I enjoy keeping busy creating.



Stan had angioplasty in 1996 and has had some health challenges throughout the years, not related to his heart. We, too, are ready to eliminate stress as much as possible.

Was interested to read your husband couldn't get health ins. in Mexico. I must have misunderstood some info. that stated Blue Shield/Cross was in Mexico. I interpret that Stan could not receive the insurance in Mexico either.

About the insurance - you should contact the insurances in my book, or any others you may find on the web.

Dick wasn't accepted, but we could have gotten Mexico's National Insurance. We just weren't comfortable with that, but we have friends in Maz who think it's great - just a personal call.

Cheap Heavy Duty Window Cleaner:

½ cup house-hold ammonia

2 cups rubbing alcohol

1 teaspoon liquid dish-washing detergent (Dawn)

Education in Mexico is free, as are books, but all else must be provided by parents.

Education is one of the Government of Mexico's highest priorities. The education budget has increased significantly in recent years; funding in real terms for education has increased by almost 25% over the last decade. Education in Mexico is now being decentralized from federal to state authority in order to improve accountability. Although educational levels in Mexico have improved substantially in recent decades, the country still faces daunting problems.

Education is mandatory from ages 6 through 18. In addition, the Mexican Congress voted in December of 2001 to make one year of preschool mandatory, which went into effect in 2004.

An inexpensive Tub and Tile Cleaner:

1 2/3 cups baking soda

1/2 cup dishwashing liquid

1/2 cup water

2 tablespoons white vinegar

And when you're in Maz, visit the hospital - talk with the administrator.

Second thing that comes to mind is - schooling for your daughter. Private more than likely - and they are available there. What a great opportunity to broaden her experiences!

Hi Jack - Very good question! Our son's wife is Czech - and I have never researched that! So I will now!

I'm sure she (your wife) has an up-to-date passport - you need one too - to get back to visit the states when you want or need to.

Now, to be allowed into Mexico, Mexico's requirements are basically proving income in a certain amount. IMSS - MEXICAN MEDICAL

Many foreign residents of Mexico do not know the Social Security System of Mexico (IMSS) medical coverage is available to all.

All residents of Mexico are eligible without exception, other than those who suffer from chronic disease such as diabetes, cancer or heart disease.

Requirements for proof of birth date, nationality, etc. can be satisfied with a current passport, and when necessary, Doctors at clinics can conduct necessary examinations and determine eligibility.

Age is not a consideration.

Upon acceptance, cost is per person per year and according to age: as much as 2568 pesos for age 60+ to as low as 977 pesos for age 19 and under (March 2004 rates). Cost is subject to change from one year to the next.
